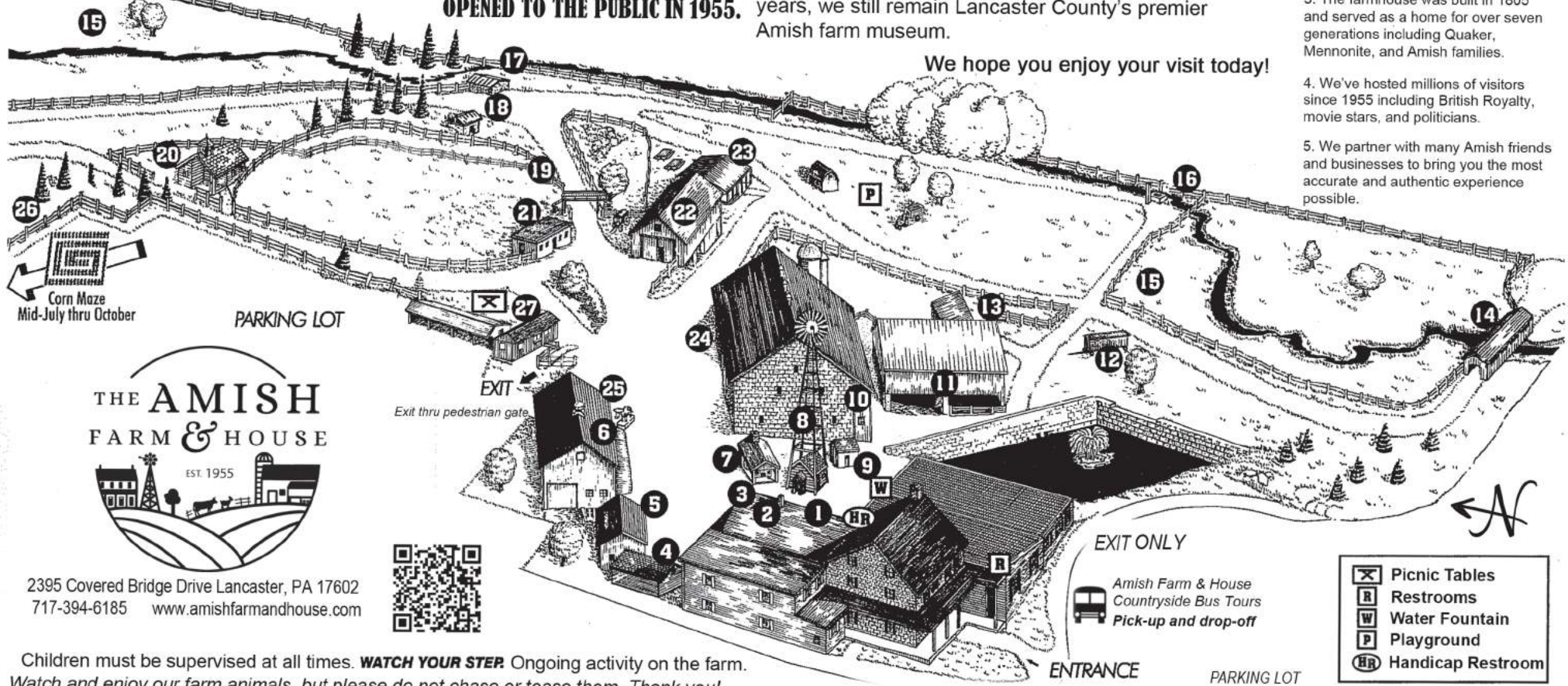

## Did you know...?

1. We were the first Amish farm museum in the United States.
2. This farm was granted to Governor John Evans from William Penn in 1715.
3. The farmhouse was built in 1805 and served as a home for over seven generations including Quaker, Mennonite, and Amish families.
4. We've hosted millions of visitors since 1955 including British Royalty, movie stars, and politicians.

1. Hand Dug, Stone Lined Well 25 ft to water, 12ft of water
2. Summer Kitchen
3. "Cucumber Pump" powered by the wire connected to the water wheel, located in the creek #16.
4. Exhibitor Shed
5. Blacksmith Shop
6. Tobacco Shop
7. Bake Oven, Smoke House, Drying House
8. 70 foot Windmill provides power to pump water from cistern
9. Milk House
10. Lower level of 1803 Stone Bank Barn houses cows, horses, pigs

11. Straw Shed built on stone pillars
12. Amish Bench Wagon
13. Chicken Houses and Fowl Pens for peacocks and pheasants
14. Willow Hill Covered Bridge (built circa 1855)
15. Meadow and Animal Pens
16. Stream, Dam, and Water Wheel powers cucumber pump (#3) via wire
17. Spring House, water wheel powers "Peter Shirk Pump" which forces the cold spring water into the summer kitchen refrigerator (#2)
18. Lime Kiln where limestone was burned to produce lime for white washing, mortar and fertilizer.
19. "Scooter Run" activity area (adult supervision required)

20. Willow Lane Amish One-Room Schoolhouse
21. Goat Bridge and Animal Pen
22. Corn Barn where corn was air dried in corn crib. Woodcarving demonstrations April through October.
23. Picnic Pavilion
24. Upper level of 1803 Stone Bank Barn used for threshing grain and storing hay. Buggy Rides (seasonal)
25. Milk "Buttercup" the cow
26. Fields for crops, Corn Maze mid-July through mid-October.
27. "The BBQ Barn"- Amish made food (seasonal)
